Experienced in presenting corporate videos, she also hosted a two-day international policing conference, security seminars and has others in the pipeline. In addition she has written, produced and presented several corporate videos for the police service. Jacqui regularly lectures to the Senior Detectives Course at the Metropolitan Police Crime Academy on media strategies within crime investigations and presentation skills, and had a regular letters page in 'Crime Confidential' magazine.
